From the Rector: That your joy may be complete

Spring is here. Go outside now and the colors are glistening everywhere, as bulbs burst, forsythia's bright yellow shines, buds begin to blossom all around. It is beautiful.

But somehow, this year, it does not seem quite as special as last year. Last year, we shoveled and shivered our way through a snowy and frigid winter. Spring was such a joyful relief. This year, with no measurable snow and record warmth, there is barely a change from season to season. There is not that same sense of relief and joy that comes after struggling through the long dark days.

The same thing can happen with our spiritual life and our experience of Easter. If we have not kept an observant Lent, Easter will still come. But it will not come with the same joy; we will not appreciate it in the same way.

The good news is, as I write this, that we are not quite halfway through the season of Lent. We still have time to set aside for extra prayer, reading of scripture and fasting, or some other special practice to make us mindful of walking the way to Jerusalem with Jesus.

The season of Lent was originally a time to prepare for baptism. This year we will begin the most Holy Week with baptism, confirmation, reception, and recommitment to our own baptisms, as the bishop leads us through the palm procession and dramatic reading of the passion.

Through that week, we have services which help us to re-experience the last supper, the way of the cross of Good Friday, and our first celebration of the resurrection at the Easter Vigil on Saturday evening.

To know the true joy of Easter, like Spring after a blizzard-filled winter, we need to journey into the depths of the sorrow and agony of Jesus' betrayal, scourging, nailing and hanging in the mid-day sun until his suffocating death; and then the spear piercing his side.

So once again, I invite you to keep a faithful Lent and a holy Holy Week, that your Easter joy may be complete.

Special parish meeting

A special parish meeting of All Saints' Church will take place on Sunday, 27 April, at 12:30 p.m. for the purpose of voting on changes to the All Saints' bylaws / constitution as required by the Canons Committee of the Convocation.

The changes are as follows:

1. With regard to Paragraph 2.2 (Electoral Roll/Qualifications), we would prefer a reference to Can. I.17 of the National Canons. That would mean that adult members of TEC whose Baptism is duly recorded in the Parish Register of All Saints' (and who make application as provided in lit. c if this is regarded as necessary) are entitled to voice and vote at Annual and Special Parish Meetings.
2. With regard to Paragraph 11 (Rector and Assistant Ministers), we should specify that these need the Bishop's approval to assume their office (canon I. 15). The present text ("after consultation with the Bishop") might be construed as meaning that the Bishop must be given opportunity to voice his opinion concerning the candidate, not that his consent is necessary.

The Bylaws/Constitution of All Saints' states that when a special meeting is called, it can only deal with the business announced in the notice for the meeting, so this should not be a long meeting, but it is necessary.

Transformed by stories

One recent Sunday, parishioners arrived to find our seating changed to a more communal arrangement. All our music, prayer, and scripture was about God's vision calling us to change and journey in faith with God. The sermon was short (a 'homily') and then we broke into small groups where we tried to see the similarities and connections between our own journeys and God's call of Abram, keeping in mind that 'the spirit blows where it will'.

Following this was a short weaving together of themes from the day's worship, which concluded with the children joining us after a special Kindermusik program, singing *We are marching in the light of God* and Eucharist.

The spirit of the day was shown by people staying a very long time for coffee hour, continuing conversations and deepening bonds that formed through the shared stories in small groups.

Special thanks are due to Michael Black, Bob DeWitt, Carol Ducastel, Felicity Handford, Julia Leigh and our clergy for putting the day together, and Debbie Brook for joining the team of small group facilitators.

We will have another TBS day on Sunday, 25 May entitled, 'Kaleidoscope God', with the theme of God with us as a community of different people from different places, cultures, languages and ages.

Weaving the stories



A 'weaving' collects the various strands of our shared experiences and tries to construct a larger impression of what was expressed in the small groups. This is not an easy task, not only because of the breadth of what was said but also for what was left unsaid. The weaving becomes more of a patchwork, waiting for complementary pieces to be added later on. This will undoubtedly be done as we listen to one another's stories over the coming months.

Actually, the image of a patchwork is not far off from one key thought that was expressed in most of the groups: that our lives are ever changing and our life journeys are never complete. The story of Abram and Sarai speaks to many of us, who have at various times left behind the familiar setting of where we were in order to go toward what we would become.

This has taken many forms: going off to school, taking on a new career or moving to a country that was foreign to us. We have found that the becoming, though difficult, has often yielded positive results. There were indeed surprises along the way, but the journey has led to a stronger and more expansive self. We have been stretched in ways that we could not have anticipated. We have become more honest about life and about ourselves. We have become more adaptable, more prayerful, more trusting. And we have been forced to ask difficult questions about faith and about what ultimately sustains us.

We look back with gratitude on these experiences. The process of getting there has required courage. Moving into the unknown can be frightening. But sometimes it just seems to be the right thing to do. At times circumstances have compelled us to make a move. Or we have made a decision, the outcome still unclear but still trusting in God. Or we take a 'leap of faith', against all reason but still feeling at a gut level that we were making the right choice.

The spirit is like the wind, said Jesus; we cannot know for sure where it is coming from or where it is going. This is no less true for our lives as a church as it has been for our personal lives. And although we would like more assurance than just 'wind', we recognize that what we have learned along the way will help us face other challenges in the future. We will do so confident of God's help and presence in wherever God leads us.

Journeying God

Sunny Hallanan's homily from the first Transformed By Stories service, 2 Lent 2014, was based on this reading from Genesis 12:

The Lord said to Abram, 'Go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the land that I will show you. I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you, and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing. I will bless those who bless you, and the one who curses you I will curse; and in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed.' So Abram went, as the Lord had told him; and Lot went with him.

The first 11 chapters of the Bible are stories that mostly have the same theme. God makes good. People make bad. To correct them, God punishes. We heard this last week with Adam and Eve, eating of the tree and being thrown out of the garden. We know about Noah and the flood. We may remember the Tower of Babel. But these punishments don't make people change.

So God tried a different approach – starting with today's story, which is a turning point in the Old Testament. God begins a new plan. God invites Abram to become the start of a special relationship with God that will be an example to all the people of the world.

Imagine this – a 75-year-old couple who have never been able to have children, settled down comfortably in their lives. Then Abram hears God speak to him and say: 'Go – pick up and leave your country, and your relatives, and everything that is familiar to you here – and move – to an unknown place. And when you do – I will make you a father of a great nation and will bless you, and others will be blessed because of you.' Imagine that!

The Bible does not tell us why God chose Abram – of all people. He seems to have been just an ordinary person, who did not especially earn or deserve to be chosen. It could have been me – or you!

In fact – Abram and Sarai don't seem to be a good choice – to be the parents of a great nation when they don't even have any children at 75?

And the Bible does not tell us why Abram chose to do what God asked. There is no sign that he was an especially religious person at that point. And there was a lot to risk in going. Why would Abram go to an unknown place, and leave everything that was safe, and comfortable, and all his relatives except his wife and a nephew? Most of us barely travel to the other side of town without our GPS.

And This was the start of God's new plan for healing humanity?

Yes.

Abram went. And all those blessings that God promised Abram – they did all come.

Abraham did become known as the Spiritual father of the three great religious faiths of Judaism, Christianity and Islam.

And he acquired great wealth and other success along the way.

All beginning with the short bit of story we heard today.

Perhaps we are missing many of the details of the story on purpose – so we can see how God worked in Abram and apply it to our own lives, filling in the details from our own experience.

It is a story of hearing God.

We don't know how Abram heard – was it an audible voice? Or was it an idea that just popped into his head and stayed there, pushing at him, or tugging his heart. Or was it a vision or dream?

Somehow, Abram knew God wanted him to do this, and would bless him in so doing.

It is a story of facing the unknown – facing fears, facing strangers, facing a strange land.

When Abram set out, there were so many things he did not know, so many adventures in front of him that he could not predict.

When we set out on any journey there are unpredictable things ahead of us. Perhaps not as many unknowns as Abram faced. But there are always unknowns, that require a certain amount of trust, or we would not go.

It is a story of blessing.

Abram was promised blessings – and they did come. But they did not come right away. There were many trials, many setbacks, and they did not come in the way one might have expected. It was another 25 more years before Abram and Sarai had a child, for example. Blessing comes – sometimes in surprising ways.

Finally, it is a story about any journey.

Though Abram and Sarai set forth on a physical journey, sometimes God calls us to a journey inside ourselves, to the spiritual journey of a new way of thinking, or



Abridged Minutes of the Vestry Meeting held on 17 February 2014 at 7.30 p.m. at All Saints' Church, Waterloo

1. Meeting opened with a **prayer** led by a member of Vestry.
2. Our **tenant** has paid some of the overdue rent but is still €1,000 in arrears. The decision not to renew his rental agreement (expiring on 15 March) remains.
3. We will update the **building's security procedures** (door codes and building alarm) in the near future.
4. Vestry discussed what they would be doing if they were not attending this evening's meeting, and reviewed whether the way we currently meet is the most effective way for Vestry to fulfill its purpose (responsibility for finances and property as well as supporting the church's mission). We blend a combination of accomplishing our formal meeting tasks with getting to know one another to work together. Some members would like it less formal, some more.
5. **Visibility:** An advertisement has been submitted to Expats Magazine. There will be a follow-up on a mistake on the Waterloo commune's website showing our old information. It is helpful if anyone finds wrong information about the church that they let us know so that we can correct it!
6. **Formation** is finishing plans for TBS. Youth may attend Youth Across Europe in France in May.
7. **Fellowship:** We are planning on having a **Carnival celebration** with pancakes after the service on the Sunday before Shrove Tuesday.
8. **Outreach / mission** reported that survey results were discussed at a recent meeting with the parish. No decision was made to change our current set of recipients. Another meeting will be held in May. All Saints' will participate in Relay for Life at St John's International School. We are trying to find ways to support charities by enabling them to make use of our building. It was

expressed (by a newcomer to the parish) that we do support quite a lot of charities. Our website has been updated to reflect our charities with links to further information. Most of the money funding outreach comes from bake sales and shoebox donations (usually for emergency relief and aid). The Vestry continues try to move towards giving 10% of our budget to outreach.


9. There is ongoing investigation into solar panels.
10. **Finance & property:** Mike provided a trial balance for 2013 to the Vestry. In summary, our income is not as high as expected, but our expenses were also lower. We need to be ready, when the Bishop arrives, to explain the details of the Roi Baudouin fund. The number of pledges turned in so far is not as high as last year. The AGM should be reminded that even with the Campbell gift, we still owe nearly a million euros on the building.
11. **The AGM** will follow a similar format as last year's. We will review our parish story & mission, conduct official business, and elect new Vestry members.
12. **Vestry retreat** (12 April): The Bishop will arrive at the end of the retreat on the 12th. We will run the retreat from approximately 9am to 4pm. The Vestry will meet with the Bishop afterwards and conclude with dinner.
13. **Waterloo 2015 celebrations:** The Rotary Club wants to use only our parking lot with tents on the Friday. The Vestry agreed to allow the Rotary Club to have a retainer for the event.
14. The Rector reported that she participated in several ecumenical events lately, including **The Week of Christian Unity** (here and in Brussels).
15. In Lent, we will try a reusable **worship guide** that does not require parishioners to search through as many books. We hope to have a French version available by Easter.
16. The church **van** is dying. We may need to purchase a new (used) van soon.
17. The meeting closed with prayer led by a member.

***What are each of these?**


Baptism: Full initiation by water & the Holy Spirit into Christ's body the Church.

Confirmation: In the course of their Christian development, those baptized at an early age are expected, when they are ready and have been duly prepared, to make a mature public affirmation of their faith and commitment to the responsibilities of their Baptism and to receive the laying on of hands by the bishop.

Reception: A person who has already been confirmed in another denomination [with the laying on of hands in apostolic succession] is welcomed into the episcopal fellowship of the Episcopal church.

Reaffirmation: A person who has been confirmed and wishes to make a public recommitment of their baptism.

Holy Week at All Saints'

Palm Sunday, 13 April at 11 a.m.

Jesus' victorious entry into Jerusalem, with members of the congregation taking part in a dramatic reading of the Passion Story, Procession of Palms & Eucharist led by Bishop Whalon.

Maundy Thursday, 17 April at 8 p.m.

At his last meal with his disciples before his arrest and crucifixion, Jesus washed their feet and commanded them to love one another. He promised to be with them in the bread and wine when they gathered this way always. This moving service ends with stripping the altar in silence.
