We continue to have a weekly shorter, more reader-friendly newsletter in the form we have called e-Blasts – they simply "blast" the priority news of the congregation more regularly, through a quick-read email. ### Rector's worship thoughts: Our Nation is the Kingdom of God

In the Peace Tower on Diksmuide, near where the trenches of the 1st World War began, there is a museum area which explains the power of Nationalism as an instigator of hatred and dehumanization causing conflict. I keep this in mind every time we approach nationalistic holidays in relation to the church. We do not worship

a nation. We do not worship a flag or a country for which it stands. We worship only God, known to us in Jesus Christ and through the Holy Spirit. There are many social influences to join in celebrating various potentially nationalistic events, which I want to recognize, with the reminder that God and the whole kingdom are our true celebrations.

For the marking of American 4th of July, and indeed for all nationalist commemorations, I have found two hymns whose words are especially appropriate in reminding us of our true identity, not in a place defined by earthly geography, but by God's creation of the whole of it. So it is that on the Sunday closest to the US national holiday that we recently sang two hymns that especially express our faith and understanding, as Christians, of the tendency toward nationalism. The words of the first are:

This is my song, O God of all the nations, A song of peace for lands afar and mine. This is my home, the country where my heart is; Here are my hopes, my dreams, my sacred shrine. But other hearts in other lands are beating, With hopes and dreams as true and high as mine. My country's skies are bluer than the ocean, And sunlight beams on cloverleaf and pine. But other lands have sunlight too and clover, And skies are everywhere as blue as mine. O hear my song, O God of all the nations, A song of peace for their land and for mine.

The other song we sing is commonly called *The Battle Hymn of the Republic*. We often get so caught up in the vibrant music that we do not catch the power of the words of Julia Ward Howe:

I have seen Him in the watch fires of a hundred circling camps,
They have builded Him an altar in the evening dews and damps,
I can read his righteous sentence in the dim and flaring lamps,
His day is marching on.
Glory! Glory! Hallelujah! Glory! Glory! Hallelujah Glory! Glory! Hallelujah! His truth is marching on.

He has sounded forth the trumpet that shall never call retreat, He is sifting out human hearts before His judgment seat, Oh, be swift, my soul, to answer Him! Be jubilant, my feet, Our God is marching on

In the beauty of the lilies Christ was born across the sea, With a glory in his bosom that transfigures you and me, As He died to make us holy let us live to make all free, His truth is marching on

From the air, looking down, we do not see true lines separating us. We are one – one with the people who are driven from Syria and Sudan to the safety of Syria. We are one – one with those who join us having left their places of birth in Rwanda and Burundi. We are one – one even with those on the other side of the Atlantic, or elsewhere even more distant. In Christ there is no East or West, in him no South or North, but one great fellowship of faith throughout the whole wide earth. Languages and politicians may separate us, but in the God who makes and loves us all, we are one.

# WATERLOO UNCOVERED

## **ARCHAEOLOGY WEEKEND**

# WATERLOO BATTLEFIELD, BELGIUM SATURDAY 14<sup>TH</sup> AND SUNDAY 15<sup>TH</sup> JULY

**Waterloo Uncovered (WU)** is the groundbreaking charity that combines veteran support and recovery with a world-class archaeology excavation of one of the world's most famous battlefields - Waterloo.

Finds of international importance are uncovered by WU every summer, attracting interest from academics and enthusiasts alike.

As well as excavating the battlefield, and educating the public about archaeology, history and the Battle of Waterloo, Waterloo Uncovered supports serving and veteran military personal.

In July 2018, WU will conduct its fourth annual excavation, with a team of over 90, 1/3 of whom will be veterans. Many injured and facing the daunting prospect of restarting life after the military.

Participation in WU has been shown to support the veteran's education, wellbeing, recovery from physical and mental injury (including PTSD), and, the often uncomfortable and dangerous, move from service into the civilian world.

This year WU will run its first *Waterloo Uncovered Archaeology Weekend* – an outreach and education event, taking place on Saturday 14 July, that will allow visitors from across Europe, for the first time, to experience the charity's exciting archaeological work. As well as a guided walk of the a battlefield on Sunday 15 July.



Saturday 14th, 10.00 to 17.00 — Hougoumont Farm

- ♦ POP-UP MUSEUM AND FINDS HANDLING Showcasing the archaeological work of WU, and allowing visitors to handle finds not seen for 200 years. The museum will include activities specifically designed for children, and information will be in French and English.
- ♦ DIGGING IN ACTION Trenches will be open, with archaeologists and veterans in them, digging and finding new and important artefacts in front of the visitors. Ends at 16.00.
- ◆ ARCHAEOLOGY AND HISTORY TOURS (11.30 & 14.30) Supported by the 1815 Battlefield Guides, guided tours of WU's excavations will run (in French and English). A self-guided 30 min walking tour will also be available to take any time.
  - ◆ NAPOLEONIC REENACTORS Reenactors will bring the past to life, showing off their uniforms, military skills and knowledge.

    Blank-firing musket demonstrations will be held at 12.00 & 15.00.
    - ♦ NAPOLEONIC WARGAME A table top battle, played with 28mm model solders, that visitors can participate in, to test their tactical skills and see how they might have fought in 1815.
      - Free parking is available at the Memorial 1815, and a free shuttle bus throughout the day to Hougoumont Farm.

### Abbreviated highlights of the Vestry meeting of 14 May 2018

- 1. The meeting opened with everyone reading the **prayer** from 'Thy Kingdom Come'.
- 2. Absence: Katie Osweiler (Curate), Nadia Molenstra
- 3. **Approval of minutes from the last meeting:** The minutes of the April Vestry meeting were approved unanimously.
- 4. **Vestry check-in:** We welcomed Susan Downhill as our newest member (approved by email vote in April.) Sunny referred to the Easter 7 Gospel: Jesus prayed for his disciples that they may have his joy complete in themselves. What brings Vestry members joy? Answers varied from a good putt straight down the middle to enjoying the seasons, being by the sea, completing a long walk or a climb up a mountain, and getting joy from grandchildren. How might we bring joy to people inside/outside ASC? By developing a good sense of community, putting on fellowship events that we know work (Thanksgiving, summer barbecue). Our focus now is Convention, but how can we boost interest? Through food perhaps, with a monthly community dinner. ASC used to hold theatre dinners in the past *Under Milkwood* and home groups, though this would be challenging with the lower numbers we have today.

### 5. Ministry and committee reports:

#### 5.1. Formation

a. Michael Smets-Tolley reported that Sunday School is going well and starting to wind down for the summer break. Hopefully new teachers will come forward in the fall. Attendance is running between 6 and 12 children. Sunny suggested that attendance is tracked. Teachers' gifts will be bought/made by the children for the end of Sunday School on 17 June. The Rite 13ers had a great weekend at JAE in Clermont-Ferrand. Suggestions are needed for the *Book of Wisdom*, plus plans for a new Youth Group next year.

### 5.2. Convention

a. The registration procedure is in place and awaiting for Bill Bythell's final approval.

### 5.3. Fellowship

a. Gabrielle Conforti-Quinet reported that we had a very successful 'Katie Day' and Blue Jean Sunday. She will arrange a date for the summer barbecue with the Pandian-Molenstras.

#### 5.4. Outreach

- a. In Katie Osweiler's absence, Sunny announced that the annual Convocation Pentecost Mission Sunday ingathering this year is for Puerto Rico hurricane relief.
- b. Relay for Life, 2-3 June. Nine people are signed up and ASC is currently in fifth place for donations raised.
- c. An Outreach mission project could be suggested for the Sunday School and Rite 13. For example, they could prepare the bake sale to raise money, or update the greeting cards that are for sale.

### 5.5. Finance & Property

- a. The roof has been repaired. This leaves the outside wall still to be fixed. Someone is coming soon to give a quote.
- b. Sicli want us to have a maintenance contract for the fire protection. This would cost €695 + VAT p.a. It was decided not to go ahead.
- c. All Saints' has received a letter from the Braine-l'Alleud commune that a Shell petrol station is going to be built at Ch. de Charleroi 579, Waterloo, part of the expansion at the Carrefour area across the road from the church.
- d. Mike has just sent a further €6,000 to our lender.

#### 6. Other business:

6.1 Appointment of Junior/People's Warden

Nick Fern was appointed Junior/People's Warden. He wants to develop a plan to pay off the loan on the building.

6.2 Online Safeguarding

There are two classes to be done for those working with the Sunday School/ Rite 13ers/ Youth Group. There is one course to be followed by all Vestry members.

6.3 eBlast and Saints Alive!

Michael said he was appreciating the new eBlast style. Fiona White said that she and Sunny would appreciate contributions being sent in to them for the monthly magazine.

6.4 Planters

Gabrielle asked what members thought about planters at the front of the church. It was felt these would look good but there needs to be a maintenance plan in place whenever anything is added to church property.

### 7. Rector's report

Sunny hoped that everyone enjoyed 'Katie Day'.

The church has a large number of archives. She has bought a cabinet for them but the papers need to be sorted out. Next year is ASC's 40th anniversary. It would be good to put together a rogues' gallery of rectors. Gabrielle and Nick offered to sort out the archives.

We still need photos of everyone in the parish on the board in the café. Someone needs to take charge of it.

Everyone needs to complete the form concerning the new data regulation. Churches may well be targeted so we need to comply.

There is a course for Vestry members coming up, organized by the Academy of Parish Leadership. Costs will be covered for three Vestry members to attend 15-16 June, just outside Paris. Others have found this course very worthwhile.

8. Everyone read the prayer from 'Thy Kingdom Come'. The meeting ended at 21.30.
