From the Rector: Top 10 Reasons to be an Episcopalian

When comedian Robin Williams died, among the many humorous memories shared was his list of the Top 10 Reasons to be an Episcopalian. (Sadly, a rumor was started that he did not write this, but evidence has been produced to show that he did.)

Each of these are indeed characteristics of the church that we can laugh at, but also be thankful for. They may even be why some of us are in this denomination. I know that analyzing a joke can make it less funny, but not knowing the context and references of a joke can keep it from making sense. As I looked at the list, I realized that to some people it would not all make sense, or be fully understandable. So here's the annotated list:

10. **No snake handling.** There is more than one ending to the Gospel of Mark. In one version, in chapter 16, Jesus sends the disciples out to take the Gospel to the world, saying that believers will be able to handle poisonous snakes and not be harmed. In the Book of the Acts of the Apostles, when St Paul is a prisoner in Malta, a poisonous snake bites him. The people are sure that he will die, as a punishment from God. Instead he lives. They are so impressed they listen to his message and become followers of Jesus. Based on these two stories in the Bible, there are some Christian churches that include handling poisonous snakes in their worship services, as a sign of faith. While this is not a practice of the Episcopal church, I blessed a boa constrictor once at an Animal Blessing!
9. **You can believe in dinosaurs.** In the United States, I am embarrassed to say, there are many churches that teach that evolution is a false theory. They say that Genesis says God created the earth in seven 24-hour days, 6,000 years ago. Dinosaurs have been extinct for 65 million years; they would have never existed if the earth is only 6,000 years old.
8. **Male and female God created them; male and female we ordain them.** Women have been ordained in the Episcopal church since 1974 unofficially, and officially since 1976. As of the Episcopal General Convention of 2012, no one may be excluded from ordination solely because of their gender or sexual identity.
7. **You don't have to check your brains at the door.** We use theologian Richard Hooker's Three-Legged Stool – the idea that we know God through an equal balance of Scripture, Tradition, and Reason. Reason may be based on scientific

knowledge or experience, and reveals God to us as much as the Bible and the historic practices of the church.

6. **Pew aerobics.** Stand, sit, kneel – plus stretch to pick up a different book every few minutes. (Plus – you get out of the pew to have communion.)
5. **Church year is color-coded.** When you walk into church, you can quickly tell which season or special day it is. (Blue for Advent, White for Christmas, Easter and All Saints, Green for Epiphany and Ordinary time, Red for Holy Week, Pentecost and martyrs. Rose is for the ‘lighten up’ weeks of Advent and Lent.)
4. **Free wine on Sunday.** My Dad was raised Roman Catholic. He joked that wine was one reason he converted. Now they allow lay people to receive as well. But many denominations have unfermented grape juice instead. On the other hand, communion in one kind, bread or wine, is communion. So if you can’t have wine or bread, if you have the other it counts. If for medical reasons you can’t consume either, you receive either by touching the lips or through your eyes.
3. **All of the pageantry – none of the guilt.** We have all seven sacraments, vestments and traditional ceremonial in the Episcopal Church. The topics of sin, punishment and hell are not as often a focus of worship as are hope, forgiveness and the Kingdom of God. (That said, we usually do have regular confession and absolution in our services, as well as the option of the sacrament of private confession.)
2. **You don’t have to know how to swim to get baptized.** This is true – but we know that the symbol of water and the new life that comes with baptism is important. So actually, immersion baptism is now available in many Episcopal churches, and many are now re-introducing full-sized fonts with flowing water. By the way, I recently learned that at one time the church that was here before the Swedish church owned our building had an immersion pool located where the organ is now!

And the Number One reason to be an Episcopalian:

1. **No matter what you believe, there’s bound to be at least one other Episcopalian who agrees with you.** We do have a wonderful variety of understandings and expressions of the faith, along with the vast diversity of members.

These are Robin Williams’ Reasons for being Episcopalian. What are yours?

Transformed By Stories (TBS)

Jesus said “The Kingdom of God is like...” and then, rather than recite some facts or use descriptive terms, he went on to tell a story. Each of us have stories, and we feel we best know one another, and draw inspiration, from sharing parts of our stories.

We’ve been asked to give a heads-up about the format for TBS taking a little (but not a lot) more time than a regular Sunday morning service, so plan for that as you look forward to worship on 19 October. The funny thing is, after the previous TBS services, most people chose to stay even longer than usual for fellowship time when worship was over!

COFFEE HOUR HELPERS NEEDED




Farewell to Deborah and Dick Whittingham

Abridged Minutes of the Vestry Meeting held on 18 August 2014 at 7.30 p.m. at All Saints' Church, Waterloo

1. The meeting opened with **prayer**.
2. After further research into the exact requirements of the *Foundation Roi Baudouin*, Vestry determined that **investing the remaining Campbell Funds** in it would not meet All Saints' need for a fund which could be accessible for critical situations for the parish. The need for this access was proven over the summer. Other forms of investment will be considered.
3. Planning continues for the **35th Anniversary celebration**. The food and dance will cost us €35, so the only way the event might provide income for the parish is through the silent auction.
4. The Comité Interreclésial de Bruxelles (CIB) is organizing the main worship service on 18 June 2015 for the **Waterloo 2015** celebrations. Rev. Sunny is on the steering committee, newly appointed as representative of the Anglican Churches of Belgium.
5. We now have a **bench** in front of the church, which has been well received by the general public. We will put our name on the bench and a sign asking people to respect the area and not litter. Two people have gone out of their way to thank us!
6. Anders Marvik did a fantastic job of clearing away overgrowth on our front perimeter **helping our curb appeal** immensely. New member, Max Bobbitt, has been volunteering with **painting**. Jenn Blanco sorted out the Sunday School supply area and some of our **archives**. Mike Breton has managed numerous building situations for us all summer. We **encourage more parishioners to help around church!**
7. Plans are underway for the fall **Sunday School** curriculum, including introduction of a 'boulders' class for the slightly older children alternate weeks, and re-starting **Acolytes** and other **leadership opportunities for children** in worship. Jennifer has agreed to be our Sunday School coordinator. We are still searching for someone to **run our Nursery**. Transformed by Stories will be on 19 October.
8. Getting people together for an **Outreach Meeting** in summer is challenging. Money we collected for the hospital in Gaza has been sent (\$335). We need to

do better reporting on the many good things we do for Outreach to ensure people actually know where the money is going.

9. **Property** committee has been busy repairing leaks and gutters. New flashing was necessary around two chimneys in the Norwegian area, at additional expense. Major repairs to our sewage system have been undertaken which we hope will now solve our long-standing basement leaking problem. The total cost is over €10,000. We will approach the Swedes to ask for a contribution towards the work as it has come to light that they were aware of the problem when they sold us the building and failed to mention it. We have a new used van for the church to replace the aging one that served the church well for many years. Repairing the old van would have cost approximately €2,500 so we purchased one with half the mileage for €3,500. Mary Ellen will soon retrieve her BMW and take it with her to Spain thus clearing space in our parking lot. We are exploring improved signage for the building.
10. **Treasurer's Report:** we remain solvent. Because of people moving away, we are obtaining new volunteers to be signatories on our various accounts. The Vestry expressed their incredibly sincere thanks to Mike for all the time and effort he's contributed to running our finances and property, especially in light of everything that's gone on this summer.
11. **Associate's Report:** Christ Church Charleroi is busy planning for the next year. Events include a Harvest Festival, community ministries, and Lessons & Carols.
12. New staff for the **Norwegian Church** have arrived. We are using the opportunity to write **new agreements with all of our tenants and facility users**. We will hold a joint service with the Norwegians and Brussels International Chorale on Remembrance Day as we did last year. Sunday School has moved into what was the Associate's office, and **Our Lady of Mercy** are where the Sunday School room used to be. The **Boy Scouts** will be asked to move into the Undercroft as it may suit their various activities better. There were no complaints about building cleanliness over the summer, so apparently **reduced hours of cleaning services was no problem**.
13. Many visitors have come over the summer. While we enjoy seeing old friends, we need to also **make sure and visit with the new people** in our midst.
14. The meeting closed with the Lord's **Prayer**.


